Group-2

A candidate can opt for the literatures of a language, indicated in Group -2 as an optional subject, only if the candidate has graduated in the literature of that particular language as in the main subject. Literature of any one of the following languages: Assamese, Bengali, Bodo, Dogri, Gujarati, Hindi, Kannada, Kashmiri, Konkani, Maithili, Malayalam, Manipuri, Marathi, Nepali, Oriya, Punjabi, Sanskrit, Santali, Sindhi, Tamil, Telugu, Urdu, English.



PERSONALITY TEST

The candidate will be interviewed by a Board who will have before them a record of his/ her career. He/ she will be asked questions on matters of general interest. The object of the interview is to assess the personal suitability of the candidate for a career in public service by a board of competent and unbiased observers. The test is intended to judge the mental calibre of the candidate. In board terms, this is really an assessment of not only his/her intellectual qualities but also social traits and his/her interest in current affairs. Some of the qualities to be judged are mental alertness, critical powers of assimilation, clear and logical exposition, balance of judgement, variety and depth of interest, ability for social cohesion and leadership, intellectual and moral integrity. The technique of the interview is not that of a strict cross-examination but of a natural, though directed and purposive conversation which is intended to reveal the mental qualities of the candidate. The interview test is not intended to be a test either of the specialised or general knowledge of the candidates which has been already tested through their written papers. Candidates are expected to have taken an intelligent interest not only in their special subjects of academic study but also in the events which are happening around them both within and outside their own state or country as well as modern currents of thought and in new discoveries which should rouse the curiosity of well educated youth.

STATE PSC – CIVIL SERVICES EXAMINATIONS

All the Indian states which have state public service commission conduct civil services examination at the state level for State Civil Services, State Police Services etc. The state civil services examinations of all the Indian states and UPSC – CSE are not the same in pattern of examination but are very similar in syllabus for examination.

THE SIMILARITIES IN SYLLABUS OF CIVIL SERVICES EXAMINATIONS OF STATES AND UPSC – CSE:

1. General Studies: Every state has almost similar topics under GS in both Prelims & Mains.
2. Aptitude and Mental Ability Test: Every state has this test in the Prelims, with similar topics.
3. English Essay, Comprehension & Grammar: Every state has this test in the Prelims & Mains.
4. Interview: Every state has this, as the final round of recruitment.

THE DIFFERENCE IN SYLLABUS OF CIVIL SERVICES EXAMINATIONS OF STATES AND UPSC – CSE:

1. The only difference is that, each state requires detailed / elaborate knowledge from the candidate about his / her own respective state, in addition to other topics, in the GS paper of either Prelims or Mains or both. We at Imperial IAS also provide classes for it.

NAGALAND PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION COMMON SYLLABUS FOR CIVIL SERVICES EXAMINATION

There will be 3 (three) stages of examinations:

1. Preliminary Examination.
2. Main Examination.
3. Interview / Viva-voice

1. Preliminary Examination:

The Preliminary examination will consist of 1 (one) paper of objectivetype (MCQ with OMRAnswer Sheet) carrying a maximum of 200 marks in the syllabus given below. This Examination is meant to serve as a screening test only; the marks obtained in the preliminary examination by the candidates who are declared qualified for admission to the main examination will not be counted for determining their final order of merit. The number of candidates to be admitted to the mainexamination shall be fixed as per provisions laid down in the recruitment rules.

Syllabus for Preliminary Examination (MCQ) Marks: 200 Time: 3Hrs

The subjects to be covered will be as follows



General Science:

General appreciation and understanding of science, including matters of everyday observation and experience as may be expected of a well educated person who hasnot made a special study of any scientific discipline.*



History:

Broad general understanding of the subject in its social, economic, political aspects, social and cultural heritage of India, emphasizing unity in diversity.



Nagaland

Social, cultural and heritage of its people.



Geography:

Geography of India including the physical, social, economic, geography and on the main features of Indian agriculture and natural resources.



India Polity and Economy:

Country's political, Executive, Judicial system, Local bodies, Rural and Community Development and Economic Planning in India.



Indian National Movement:

Nature and character of the nineteenth century resurgence, growth of nationalism and attainment of independence.



General Mental Ability Test:

Analysis of classified data, logical and behavioral reasoning, analogies, basic arithmetic, numerical ability and basic concept of computers.*



Current events:

Latest development on all the fields detailed above including science and technology and environmental awareness.

*Basic Science including basic numeracy (numbers and their relationships, orders of magnitude etc.), Data interpretation (charts, graphs, tables, data sufficiency etc.) shall be of class X level.

2. Main Examination:

The main examination will consist of 3 (three) papers, namely:

- (a) General Essay, Comprehension and Grammar.
- (b) General Studies Paper – I in objective type (MCQ- with OMR sheet) and
- (c) General Studies Paper – II in descriptive form of short and long answer type

The above papers can carry a maximum of 200 marks each.

The number of candidates to be called for interview / viva-voce shall be fixed by the Commission at their discretion or as per provisions laid down in the Recruitment Rules.

Syllabus for main Examination (Descriptive & MCQ)

(a) Genral essay, Comprehension & Grammar Marks: 200 Time: 3 Hrs

(i) There will be two General Essay Questions from the following topics: Crisis management, Social problems, Analysis and solutions. Current events of national and international importance. Current events relating to State of Nagaland. 50x2=100 marks..

(ii) Comprehension 80 marks.

(iii) Grammar 20 marks

(b) General Studies Paper – I (MCQ) Marks: 200 Time: 3 Hrs

- (i) Modern history of India and Indian culture.
- (ii) Current events of national and international importance.
- (iii) Statistical analysis, graphs and diagrams.
- (iv) Basic and everyday science.

Modern history of India and Indian culture will cover the broad history of the country from about the middle of the nineteenth century (advent of European invasion) and would include questions on Gandhi and Nehru. Statistical analysis, graphs and diagrams will include exercises to test the candidate's ability to draw common sense conclusions from information presented in statistical, graphical and diagrammatical form and to point out deficiencies, limitations therein. Questions on the basic and everyday science will cover matters of everyday observations and experiences of a modern man. General information on Nagaland will also be asked.

(c) Paper – II (Descriptive) Marks: 200 Time: 3 Hrs (Paper- II will have different segments of questions ranging from 2 (two) to 20 (twenty) marks.)

- (i) India polity and Public Administration.
- (ii) Indian economy and geography.
- (iii) Social problems and sensitive issue including environmental problems.
- (iv) Nagaland geography, society, culture and heritage.
- (v) Administration in Nagaland

- Indian polity and Public Administration will include questions on Constitution, administration and Political system in India.
- On Indian economy and geography, questions will be put on planning, physical, economic and social geography of India
- Social problems and sensitive issues will include problems like child labour, HIV/AIDS, gender bias, minorities, SC/ST, illiteracy, poverty, environment etc. Global issues such as environmental problems will be covered.
- Nagaland-geography, society, culture and heritage.
- Nagaland administration will cover topics in general administration like organizational structure, local bodies, functions, control, social welfare and oriented programs etc.

3. Interview

The interview is intended to assess the overall intelligence and the personality of a candidate and also the aptitude and attitude relevant to the services opted for rather than merely the range of their information and memory.

N.B.

1. Penalty for Wrong Answers-

There will be penalty (negative marking) for wrong answers marked by a candidate in the Objective Type Question papers in both the Preliminary and Main Examinations. For each wrong answer given by the candidate, one third (0.33) of the marks assigned to that question will be deducted as penalty.

2. The different units in the syllabus may figure in all the segments, as such, no marks allotment will be shown in the curriculum for Preliminary Examination, General Studies Paper-I (MCQ) and General Studies Paper -II (Descriptive Type Questions)

HISTORY (NPSC)

- 1) Since question mostly comes in MCQ format memorizing key facts is an important aspect.
- 2) The best way to memorize historical fact is by building connections such as 1757, battle of plassey and 100 years later in 1857 we have sepoy mutiny.
- 3) Writing down important points and facts can help retain the information longer in our memory.
- 4) In NPSC, Indian National Movement is the most important section from which questions are asked in prelims and mains. However, in prelims, Ancient Indian History and Medieval Indian History both are important. Now a days lot of questions are asked from Dravidian Literature and Delhi Sultanate In prelims.

UPSC

- 1) Since most MCQ questions for UPSC are in the form of Assertion & Reasoning, it is advisable for students to have a firm grasp of the conceptual elements of any topic. Especially when it pertains to historical movements, cause, etc.
- 2) Over and above the NCERT test books and the host of other published texts which cater specifically for UPSC, it is recommended that students read at a higher level. Try reading standard prescription books for BA level. (Recommended for mains preparation).
- 3) For your prelims preparations, in the initial stage the aspirant may prepare charts and maps of important and sequential facts. These must be kept readily available and randomly accessible. However, with time on may try to reduce one's reliance upon these.
- 4) Lastly, you may try simple mental exercises. Try building a frameworks pertaining to any particular topic from any era of history and then try remembering relevant facts. You may also try solving answers without pen and paper. (Pertains to all subjects).

GEOGRAPHY (NPSC)

- 1) Weightage of Geography in NPSC is relatively less. However, questions have been asked on topics like atmosphere, earth movements etc.
- 2) For that purpose, students need to cover the NCERT only.
- 3) Questions are straight forward so along with the NCERTs, solving mock questions will be beneficial.
- 4) Static questions are more important than the dynamic ones. For example, dealing with census 2011 is of utmost important.

SUBJECT WISE TIPS ON PREPARATION (UPSC)

- 1) Geography weightage is decreasing in prelims. However, the pattern is mostly shifting
- 2) For mains, Geography is mostly related to economic and human geography. However, in this year's paper a question was asked based on geomorphology as well (mantle plume).
- 3) For a candidate it is must to go through the NCERT holistically, as questions have been frequently asked on vegetation and environment.
- 4) in recent times, weightage to environmental geography has been increasing. So, it is must for the students to go through the national parks, wildlife sanctuaries, biosphere reserves in terms of species bound and their geographic location.

SOCIOLOGY(NPSC)

- 1) Keep yourself well prepared in advance. The topic is vast and requires a lot of time.
- 2) Sociology stresses the application of theory to gain a greater understanding of social phenomena. It is often said that sociology is more concerned with formulating the proper question than in obtaining the answer.
- 3) Stay more focused on social issues/ problems and always be prepared to give your strong comment in providing solution with the existing laws/ Acts.
- 4) Focus more on the controversy issues happening currently with better justification about the issue.
- 5) Referring to previous year question papers will give you a clue on what topic to study. Prepare, because the questions are always asked in relation to which has been asked in the last exam.

UPSC

- 1) Questions are asked in direct speech based on the existing facts which means the option left for the examinee is to give his/ her personal suggestion/ justification.
- 2) Stay more focus on current problems and always be prepared to give your strong comment in providing solutions with the existing laws/ acts/ schemes.
- 3) Sociology stresses the application of theory to gain a greater understanding of social phenomena. It often said that the sociology is more concerned with formulating the proper question than in obtaining the answer.
- 4) Sociology comprises of India. There are dimensions you can add based on current realities in our reality.

ENGLISH(NPSC)

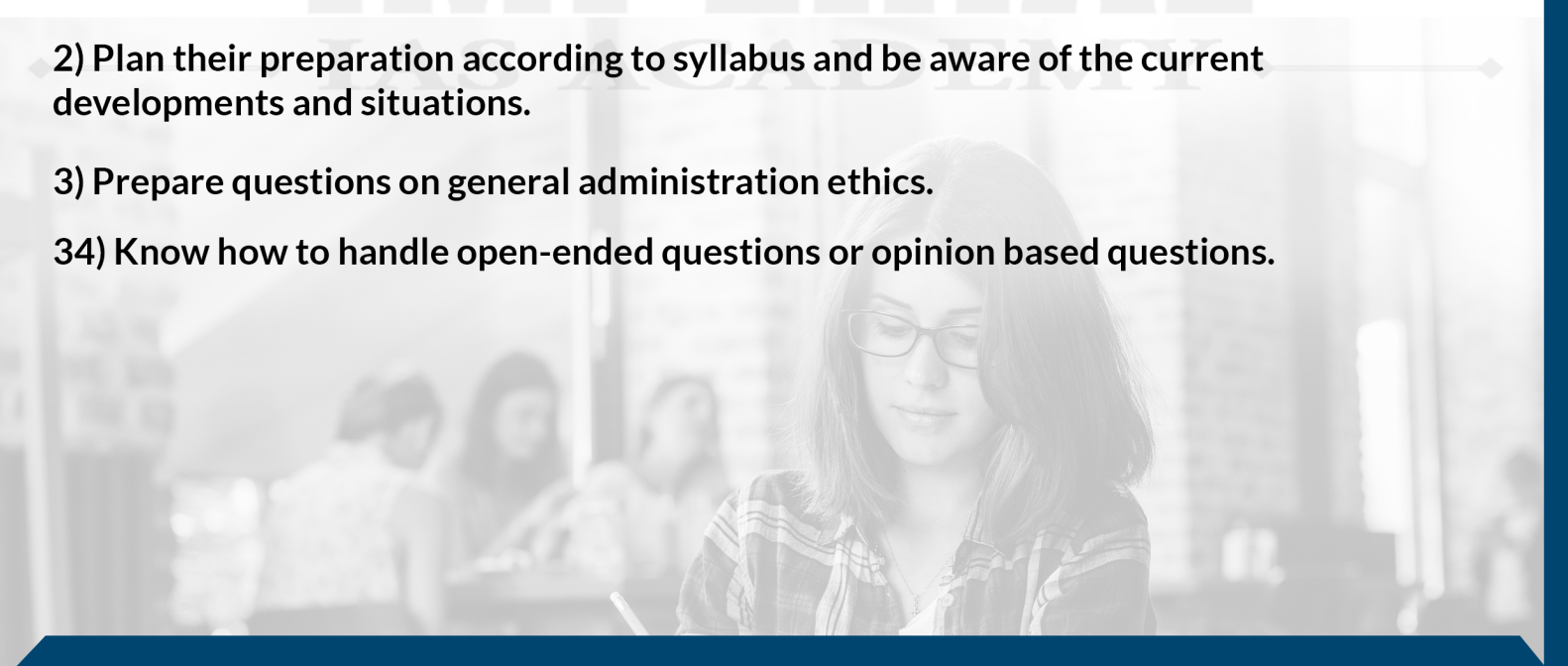
- 1) Paper comprises of essays, comprehension grammar. Since the paper is very lengthy compared to the allotted time of 3 hours, it is quintessential to practice enough and manage time in the exam hall. towards map based questions both India and the world.
- 2) Ideally, each passage should be solved within 25 minutes such that a student has enough time to solve the entire paper.
- 3) Grammar and comprehension can fetch solid marks without any deduction hence must not be ignored.
- 4) Previous years papers remain crucial for adequate and accurate practice.
- 5) Strong command over grammar usage is critical for success
- 6) Usually students focus on ornamental words and proverbs, there is much more to essay writing for civil service exams than this.

UPSC

- 1) There are two papers – one compulsory English paper the other an essay paper.
- 2) The compulsory paper includes précis writing, essay writing, comprehension and grammar.
- 3) Time management and sufficient practice is critical for the compulsory paper. General awareness about the socio economic issues is essential to write the essays.
- 4) For the essay paper critical study of national and international issues is required. Good understanding and practice of proverbial essays is inevitable.

ETHICS(NPSC)

- 1) Candidates should be aware of the question pattern and should refer to previous year questions.
- 2) Plan their preparation according to syllabus and be aware of the current developments and situations.
- 3) Prepare questions on general administration ethics.
- 34) Know how to handle open-ended questions or opinion based questions.



SUBJECT WISE TIPS ON PREPARATION (UPSC)

- 1) Candidates should be aware of the question pattern and should refer to previous year questions.
- 2) Plan their preparation according to syllabus and be aware of the current developments and situations.
- 3) Practice case studies regularly.
- 4) Know how to handle open-ended questions or opinion based questions.

ECONOMICS (NPSC)

- 1) The trend of NPSC is seen to be changing in accordance to the weightage allotted to different subjects as the competitive exams. Now taking preliminary stage of the exam, the first thing to note is the penalty against each wrong answers (i.e., 0.33) out of total of 200 questions.
- 2) To specially deal about the subject matter of Economics or Indian Economy in specific, the importance accorded to topics in NPSC GS are – Economic planning in India – from Planning Commission to the post NITI Aayog establishment, Banking in India with specific reference to the monetary policy and its tools, agricultural production and its potential in international trade, FDI, National Income etc.
- 3) The weightage of Economics questions, NPSC : Prelims (MCQ) – 8 to 9 questions . Mains - GS I (MCQ) – 5 to 6 questions, GS II (Descriptive) – 7 to 8 questions.

UPSC

- 1) The trend of UPSC according to the last 3 years question analysis for GS- Banking in India with specific reference to the monetary policy and its tools, Recent government schemes and its provisions, various boards and programs that reflect the maintenance of the nation, GST, Agricultural marketing , etc.
- 2) The weightage of the Economics questions UPSC: Prelims – (MCQ)- 24 to 25 questions Mains – GS III – 8 to 9 questions.
- 3) The subject matter of economics/ economy is since dynamic it is of very utmost importance that a student is updated with recently budget, schemes, new trade zone, inclusive financial programs, etc which in turn reflect the quality of answers written with the inclusion of such facts.

BIOLOGY (NPSC)

- 1) Just a basic knowledge of biology which a student can gain from the NCERT text books is sufficient.
- 2) Also a student should follow up daily news and articles for any kind of recent updates in science. UPSC
- 3) For a beginner, to have a basic knowledge, go through the text books of NCERT for Class XI and XII.
- 4) For UPSC cover the whole syllabus for class XI and XII. For some critical topics a student may follow the reference books such as TRUEMAN'S ELEMENTARY BIOLOGY PART I & II.
- 5) To study about the current health and disease related topic as well as for environment, one can follow up the websites such as Science Daily and Biology news on a daily basis.
- 6) Strategies required for NPSC for Nagaland aspects History, Polity & Geography
- 7) The candidates must have thorough knowledge about the subject since all aspect of Nagaland will be asked in both MCQ and descriptive.
- 8) As there will be time constraint in descriptive question paper, it is advisable that the candidates should make a ready- made note on all aspects of Nagaland.
- 9) For current affairs on Nagaland the candidates must refer the local newspaper regularly and note down which are important.
